# **April 4, 2024**

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# Regional Board Staff Initiate Effort to Improve Permittee Monitoring and Reporting Compliance

The Waste Discharge to Land Program within the Groundwater Permitting Unit initiated a process in October 2023 to audit the submittal and review of discharger Self-Monitoring Reports (SMRs) over the past five years, from July 1, 2018 through October 1, 2023. Because staff cannot possibly conduct all necessary monitoring themselves, SMRs are an indispensable component of the overall approach to water quality protection. Ensuring their timely submittal and review is a top priority of the Discharge to Land Program.

Staff pulled data the California Integrated Water Quality System (CIWQS), a computer system used by the Water Boards to manage permits, including collecting reports from permitted entities. Analysis of the data revealed that there are 242 dischargers required to submit SMRs in the Discharge to Land Program. CIWQS showed that 220 (90.9%) had missed at least one report over

the audit period, with 84 (34.7%) having submitted no reports at all. Twenty-two (9.1%) had a perfect submission record. The remaining 136 (56.2%) submitted an average of 66.7% of their required reports.

Of the 7,283 reports that were required over the audit period, 3,691 (50.1%) had been recorded as submitted in CIWQS. Program staff had reviewed 1,782 (48.3%) of the submitted SMRs. Fifty six of the 158 dischargers (35.4%) that submitted any required report had none reviewed by staff, while sixteen (10.1%) had all their SMRs reviewed by staff. Staff had reviewed an average of 59.6% of the required SMRs from the remaining 86 dischargers (54.4%).

#### Permittee Outreach

A tailored letter was sent to the permittee address on file, notifying the 220 dischargers of the missing SMRs. The letter introduced the Regional Board and the requirement to submit SMRs and contained the relevant order number and a list of the specific missing SMRs. The letter invited dischargers to: 1)

help correct our records, if they had indeed submitted the SMRs, 2) provide the missing SMRs if they had the data necessary to complete them, or 3) provide an explanation for the missing SMRs and the reasons none of the missing SMRs could be provided. The letter also reminded the dischargers of the requirement to submit all future SMRs on time and provided resources to assist in that endeavor, including a link to CIWQS¹, the Regional Board adopted orders page², the contact information of their assigned staff, and our GovDelivery listserv³.

### Initial Permittee Response

In the following weeks, dischargers and staff corresponded to resolve many outstanding issues. As of 3/8/2024, 123 dischargers had responded to their letters, a response rate of 55.9%. Dischargers we asked to respond in 60 days, so this number is expected to grow through 3/30/2024 and beyond.

Through this process, a number of database deficiencies were identified. The most common database problem was staff failing to record SMRs as having been received in CIWQS, even though the SMRs were available in the facility file. Another, less common database problem was that some dischargers were set up in CIWQS as requiring monthly, quarterly, or annual SMRs when they were not actually required to submit reports at one of those frequencies per their orders.

The vast majority of the missing SMRs were simply due to delinquent reporting. Some common reasons for delinquent reporting included dischargers not knowing they were required to submit SMRs or not having the

Still other dischargers communicated that they no longer discharged and thought their order had been rescinded. Finally, especially when ownership had changed, some dischargers had never heard of the Regional Board at all.

### Findings and Lesson Learned

Although this process is ongoing, there have been many positive outcomes. First, the database issues are being resolved and SMRs are being found and entered properly. Second, many delinquent SMRs have been submitted. Third, staff are working closely with dischargers to ensure that future reporting is done on time, that dischargers understand the requirements of their order, and that dischargers and staff are mutually aware of the challenges each faces in protecting water quality.

### What the Future Holds

Although this process has been time consuming and has revealed some problems in the Discharge to Land Program databases, it is critical for the protection of groundwater quality. The next steps will proceed on a few fronts. First, staff are in the process of documenting the letters and missing SMRs in the discharger file record. For future SMRs, staff will review all annual summary reports for each discharger every two years, follow up with reviews of routine monthly or quarterly reports when violations are reported, and conduct random spot checks of monthly or quarterly reports for a subset of dischargers. This approach will balance available staff

resources with the need to ensure overall permit compliance.

In approximately 18-24 months, staff will initiate another audit of SMR submittal. At this stage, chronically delinquent dischargers will likely be issued a Notice of Violation, following Progressive Enforcement Policy, while others will be issued another letter if they have improved their submittal rate and/or have shown a good faith effort to comply with their monitoring and reporting requirements.

### Background

In 2021, the North Coast Region had the oldest MMPs on the books in the state, and now the Prosecution Teams are proactively planning to resolve the most recent violations from 2023. Through planning, coordination, and some creativity the teams made incredible progress while still adhering to the regional priority of supporting disadvantaged communities by encouraging the development of Compliance Projects (CPs) and Supplemental Environmental Projects (SEPs) to ensure the enforcement funds were used to address water quality impacts either at the facility or locally within the watershed.

In 2021,19 facilities had outstanding MMP violations that needed resolution. To resolve those violations, the Enforcement Unit collaborated with NPDES Unit wastewater staff and OE legal staff by forming Prosecution Teams to prioritize and address the outstanding and historical violations. In the fall of 2021, the Prosecution Teams mailed several "Invitations to Enter into Settlement Discussions" to the dischargers responsible for these facilities.

However, relatively recent court decisions on the "statute of limitations" (aka laches) for MMPs led to changes in deadlines for resolving violations and modified Enforcement Program performance targets from the State Water Board. Given these changes, the North Coast Region changed its approach from inviting settlements to issuing formal administrative civil liability (ACL) complaints to meet these new metrics and act timely to

avoid invoking a laches defense<sup>5</sup>. Our OE attorneys were key participants in developing the ACL complaints and were accommodating to this new approach for our region. Our OE legal counsel helped with many difficult conversations ensuring that Prosecution Team staff were on track and represented legally when explaining to our Dischargers how to best navigate their options moving forward under the Enforcement Policy. OE staff were thoughtful in explaining our process while engaging with multiple facilities in settlement negotiations following the issuance of the formal enforcement actions. These conversations coupled with the formal enforcement actions resulted in numerous tangible benefits to water quality throughout the region as detailed below.

### Summary of Accomplishments

From 2021 to date, the Prosecution Teams issued 21 ACLs to 19 wastewater facilities within the North Coast Region. While several facilities are still developing their projects, so far, these enforcement actions have resulted in eight CPs designed to reduce facility violations; and five SEPs resulting in surface water restoration and stormwater pollutant reduction.

- 21 ACLs in two years.
- Over \$100k paid to the California Cleanup & Abatement Account.
- Over \$300k in MMPs offset by CPs and SEPs completed or in progress in Region 1.
- Regional enforcement actions leveraged over \$4 million in matching funds for water quality infrastructure improvement and habitat restoration projects.

# Enforcement Report for April 2024 Executive Officer's Report Zane Stromberg

Summary of Enforcement Actions issued between January 13, 2024 - March 8, 2024

Throughout the year, with support from the State Water Board's Office of Enforcement (OE), Regional Water Board staff (Staff) develop and manage enforcement cases starting informally through direct correspondence including issuing Notices of Violation and pursuing a progressive enforcement approach that results in formal enforcement actions such as Cleanup and Abatement Orders (CAOs), Cease and Desist Orders (CDOs), and Administrative Civil Liability (ACL) Complaints. Once Staff determine that an enforcement action will result in the issuance of an ACL Complaint, the Enforcement Team prepares supporting evidence and provides the discharger(s) an opportunity to discuss the facts relating to the violations, including the option of settlement.

Table 1 summarizes Notice of Violations (NOVs), CAOs, Investigative Orders (13267 Orders), Directive to submit Reports of Waste Discharge (13260/ 13376 Directive), Staff Enforcement Letters, Compliance Notices (CNs), and Notices of Non-Compliance (NNCs). During this reporting period, Staff issued twelve NOVs, one 13267/13304 Directive Letter, four NNCs, and one CAO. Table 2 summarizes ACL Complaints, ACL Orders, settlement negotiations pending the adoption of a final Stipulated ACL Order, and the status of Compliance Projects (CPs) and Supplemental Environmental Projects (SEPs). Settlement negotiations continued with dischargers on four cases during this reporting period.

Figure 1: NOVs Issued by the RWB Between January 13, 2024 and March 8, 2024




Figure 2: Cannabis NOVs issued Between January 13, 2024 and March 8, 2024


