ORDER NO. 71-5

WASTE DISCHARGE REQUIREMENTS  
FOR  
SAN FRANCISCO PORT COMMISSION

The California Regional Water Quality Control Board, San Francisco Bay Region, finds that:

1. The City and County of San Francisco, San Francisco Port Commission, submitted a report of waste discharge dated December 9, 1970.
2. The San Francisco Port Commission proposes to discharge Class III waste such as inert debris and demolition material mixed with soil into former shipyard slips east of the intersection of Illinois and 22nd Street near Point Potrero in San Francisco.
3. The Board adopted a water quality control policy for tidal waters inland from the Golden Gate and within the San Francisco Bay Region on June 13, 1967.
4. The beneficial uses of the San Francisco Bay are:
  - Industrial cooling
  - Swimming, wading, pleasure boating, and fishing
  - Firefighting and industrial washdown water supply
  - Fish, shellfish, and wildlife propagation and sustenance, and waterfowl and migratory birds habitat and resting
  - Navigation channels and port facilities
  - Esthetic appeal
5. The Board has notified the discharger and interested agencies and persons of its intent to prescribe waste discharge requirements for the proposed discharge.
6. The Board in a public meeting on January 28, 1971 heard and considered all comments pertaining to the discharge.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED, the City and County of San Francisco, San Francisco Port Commission, shall comply with the following:

A. Waste Discharge Requirements

1. Waste materials acceptable only at Class I or II disposal sites, as defined in this Board's Resolution No. 69-42, shall not be discharged or stored at this site at any time.

2. Waste material shall be confined to the disposal site at all times and shall not be placed in any position where it can be carried from the disposal site and discharged into waters of the State.
3. The disposal of waste shall not:
  - a. Create a nuisance.
  - b. Cause any alteration in turbidity or discoloration beyond natural background levels in waters of the State at any place.
  - c. Cause foam, oil or grease in waters of the State at any place.
  - d. Cause floating material at any place bayside of the perimeter dike of broken concrete.
  - e. Cause surface waters of the State to exceed the following limits of quality at any place:

Dissolved Oxygen	5.0 mg/l minimum
Dissolved Sulfide	0.1 mg/l maximum
pH	7.0 minimum 8.5 maximum
Other substances	Any one or more substances in concentrations that impair any of the protected beneficial water uses or make aquatic life or wildlife unfit or unpalatable for consumption.

B. Provisions

1. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

This Order includes items numbered 1, 6 and 7 of the attached "Reporting Requirements" dated August 28, 1970.

2. NOTIFICATIONS

This Order includes items numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 of the attached "Notifications" dated January 6, 1970.
