## **RE: ADOPT STRONG NEW BAY-DELTA STANDARDS**

Dear Chairwoman Marcus:

Our organizations are writing to urge the State Water Resources Control Board to adopt new, stronger water quality standards for San Joaquin River basin inflow to the Delta in its Phase 1 update of the 2006 Water Quality Control Plan for the San Francisco Bay/Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Estuary (Plan), and to strengthen its proposal for the Phase 2 update of the water quality standards for Delta outflow, Sacramento basin inflow, and in-Delta channel flows.

In August the Board will consider amending the San Joaquin basin inflow and south Delta salinity objectives in the Plan (Phase 1). The best scientific evidence – established by state and federal fish and wildlife agencies, independent researchers, our groups, and the Board itself – is clear and unambiguous; between 50 and 60 percent of the San Joaquin basin's natural winter-spring runoff must flow to the estuary in order to stabilize declining salmon and steelhead populations and support the recovery and doubling of these populations, and to protect water quality in the south Delta. However, the Board's draft final proposed flow standards, released on July 6th, call for just 30-50% of the flow from only three San Joaquin River tributaries to reach the Delta, with an initial starting point of 40% of the unimpaired flow of these tributaries. Given the dire state of salmonid populations, the public fisheries that depend on them, and water quality in the San Joaquin basin and south Delta, we urge the Board to require at least 50% of runoff from the three San Joaquin River tributaries as the starting point to protect fish and wildlife beneficial uses, public health, other public trust resources, and to allow flows to be adaptively managed above 50% as necessary to achieve the Board's biological restoration goals.

Later this year, the Board will release a full draft proposal for its update of the rest of the Plan (Phase 2). In the proceedings that led to the Board's 2010 flow criteria report to the legislature, findings of the scientific community, resource managers, and the Board itself demonstrated that between two-thirds and three-quarters of the runoff from San Francisco Bay's Central Valley watershed was necessary to reverse the trend toward extinction of numerous fish and wildlife species, restore a healthy, functional estuarine ecosystem that supports native species and habitats, and preserve water quality for a range of beneficial uses. Given that many native fish populations are at record or near-record low levels, public fisheries are increasingly constrained, and there is overwhelming evidence that the estuarine ecosystem is at risk of irreversible decline and permanent loss of fish and wildlife beneficial uses, we urge the Board to put forward a proposal that requires at least

two-thirds of Central Valley runoff to reach the Bay as the starting point for protection of beneficial uses, water quality and the public trust, and to adopt the new standards within one year.

As the Board noted in its 2010 flow criteria report to the state legislature "[t]he best available science suggests that current flows are insufficient to protect public trust resources" and "[t]here is sufficient scientific information to support the need for increased flows to protect public trust resources." We are united in urging you to act on that information and adopt strong new water quality standards as soon as possible.
